- ☐ Inspect faucets for leaks - Both above and under the sinks.

Quarterly:

- ☐ Clean range hood filters
- ☐ Check for signs of roof damage (visually)

Annually:

- ☐ Service HVAC systems
- ☐ Flush water heater
- ☐ Clean gutters and downspouts
- ☐ Inspect attic and crawl spaces for pests or moisture
